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


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

Knudtsen Chevrolet and Waste Management, Inc. have stepped up as the first two Visionary Partners for the Pre-K – Career Education Information Center.

The North Idaho Family Group, Inc., a local nonprofit focused on developing healthy families and lifelong learning, is launching a new, comprehensive Education Information Center website that will include information about education opportunities from pre-kindergarten through career. The vision for the project also includes a brick and mortar facility that will house an education information kiosk with technology and interactive displays.

The North Idaho Family Group will collaborate with regional education entities to provide the information so that the community has a 24/7 one-stop shop that will allow access to all education resources including (but not limited to) preschools, religious schools, technical professional training programs, higher education, workforce education certification, enrichment classes, and online degree courses.

The Education Information Center website will be launched by this fall. The site will not offer programs or classes, but will include comprehensive links and contact information by category to what is available in the five northern counties. Individuals seeking information will be able to search by category, location, age, or desired career. The website will also include information and "how to guides" for scholarships, ongoing education paths, grants, and accessing federal aid.

The Education Information Center is being funded initially by its Visionary Partners


Program, currently including Knudtsen Chevrolet and Waste Management, Inc.



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years of Juggling

David Groth, teacher and juggling aficionado, answers questions about the Juggling program at Sorensen Magnet School for the Arts & Humanities.

When did the juggling program start and where have you performed?

The program started in 1998. I remember our first public performance, in the bus station on First Night Spokane.

For five years we had a Sorensen based group called Levity, which traveled around the country to attend juggling festivals and perform. This included: Buffalo,

NY; Reading, PA; Reno, NV; Toronto, Canada; Seattle; Portland and more.

In the past seven years, the Sorensen Juggling Performance Team has done halftime shows at Gonzaga and Whitworth Universities, the University of Idaho and North Idaho College. They have also performed at area high schools, Festival of Trees, Hospice of North Idaho, Art on the Green, in the 4th of July parade, at Art Walk and more!

Why is the juggling program at Sorensen important (as well as other performance teams)?

At Sorensen we talk about our "culture of confidence." We think juggling is one example of how our students have gained confidence. They show it in performances.

It is a great physical activity, it's cheap, travels well and is an unlimited opportunity for creativity.

Tell us about FUZE! (a group of jugglers with Sorensen roots)

Jack, Mickey, Taylor and Chloe went to Sorensen for their entire elementary experience. By 2nd grade, it was clear they had exceptional talent: coordination, creativity and willingness to be a great member of a team. When they completed 5th grade, I suggested they continue to work together, with me as their coach. We have continued for two years now. They have performed for private parties, at all of the colleges and universities, have opened twice for Portland Juggling Festival, and much, much more.

Do you still do the Monday night juggling program?

Monday night juggling has been going since 1999, every Monday during the school year (when school is in session) and all summer at Independence Point 6:30-8:00pm. All equipment and lessons are provided; everyone in the world is welcome! We ask for a \$1 donation.

pickup.


Or, if you prefer to read on a computer, eBook reader or other portable device, CIN Digital Downloads is the way to go! A large selection of eBooks and Audio Books are available through the CIN OverDrive system. Your reading adventure is just a few clicks away, any time, day or night. You can borrow up to five books during a lending period. Lending periods may vary.

Libraries must abide by publisher lending policies including the One-Copy, One-User Model. Libraries pay for each digital copy they own just like hard copies, so only one person has access to that title at a time. If a One-Copy, One-User book you would like to borrow is already checked out, you can put it on hold and wait for it to become available.



Your CIN card also allows for free music and music video downloads through Freegal (rhymes with "legal") Music. Users are allotted a small number of downloads each week. The download counter resets on Mondays. There are millions of songs available in hundreds of genres. Freegal Music has agreements with over 28,000 music labels making their content free and legal to its users.



Dual Credit: Eligible high school students may earn college credits while satisfying high school graduation requirements by enrolling in a dual credit program. Local options include earning credits through North Idaho College or the College of Southern Idaho. Classes for NIC credit are taught at the NIC campus as well as at the Coeur d'Alene Charter Academy, KTEC, and Coeur d'Alene, Post Falls, Lake City, Lakeland, and Timberlake High Schools. Classes for dual credit are \$65 per credit. www.nic.edu/dualcredit (208) 769-3321

Tech Prep: Tech Prep provides high school students an opportunity to get an early start on a college technical program. High school juniors or seniors may enroll in approved Tech Prep courses taught by instructors at their high schools. Students can earn North Idaho College credits in a technical program and move from high school to NIC without having to repeat technical courses. techprep@nic.edu


Advanced Placement: AP is a program created by the College Board that offers college-level courses to high school students. Colleges may grant placement and course credit to students who obtain certain scores on an AP exam. For a high school course to have the AP designation, the course must be audited by the College Board to be sure it satisfies

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n 1984 began an effort **⊥** to promote involvement in crime prevention activities, police-community partnerships, and neighborhood camaraderie to send a message to criminals letting them know neighborhoods are organized and fighting back. The first National Night Out (America's Night Out Against Crime) took place on Tuesday,

August 7th, 1984. That first year, 2.5 million Americans took part across 400 communities in 23 states.

National Night Out now involves over 37.8 million people and 16,124 communities from all fifty states, U.S. Territories, Canadian cities, and military bases worldwide. The traditional "Lights On" campaign and symbolic front porch vigils turned into a celebration across America with various events and activities including, but not limited to block parties, cookouts, parades, visits from emergency personnel, rallies and marches, exhibits, youth events, safety demonstrations and seminars, in an effort to heighten awareness and enhance community relations.

It's a wonderful opportunity for communities nationwide to promote police-community partnerships, crime prevention, and neighborhood camaraderie. While one night is certainly not an answer to crimes, drugs and violence, National Night Out represents the kind of spirit, energy and determination to help make neighborhoods a safer place year round. The night celebrates safety and crime prevention successes and works to expand and strengthen programs for the next 364 days.

This year, Kootenai County's National Night Out celebration will be held on August 5, 2014 at Hayden City Park, 8930 N. Government Way (next to Hayden City Hall) from 4:00 to 7:00 pm. There will be entertainment, live music, food, drinks, give-a-ways for the kids, and crime prevention/personal safety information.





Crucial Conversations with Our Kids

In the Idaho office of Mothers Against Drunk Driving (MADD) in Boise, there is a 'wall of honor' where no one wants their loved one's photo to hang. The loss of a young life often hits and our hearts ache for the parents whose child will never return. According to the Idaho Transportation Department Office of Highway Safety, 1 out of 5 crashes in 2012 involved a youthful driver, ages 15-19, which resulted in 14 deaths and 1012 injuries in 2012. Of the 14 youth killed, 7 were driving. There's a reason the period between Memorial and Labor Day are labeled 'The 100 Deadliest Days' for teen drivers. There are many factors to consider regarding crashes involving our youth; texting, passengers, seatbelts, and distractions both in and out of the car. Impaired driving is another factor; in 2012, there were 182 crashes on Idaho roadways which were caused by impaired drivers under the age of 21.

The heartbreaking fact is that teen alcohol use kills over 4,700 people in the U.S. each year, more than all other illegal drugs combined. Research shows there's a disconnect when it comes to underage drinking: 1 out of 6 teens binge drink, but only 1 out of 100 parents think their child binge drinks. This is a staggering statistic, which supports the 'not my kid' illusion.

The good news is that three-quarters of teens also say their parents are the number one influence on their decision whether to drink or not drink alcohol. Parents impact their child's choices; by discussing the importance of waiting until they're 21 to drink and never supplying alcohol to minors, a clear message can be sent. Before the proms and summer parties, MADD encourages parents to have these crucial conversations. Idaho has several free resources to help:

Do You Know Your Auction Bidders?

This happens quite often: An organizer from an event attends another event and sees an item bring a large amount of money in the auction. This organizer decides to mimic the item and when it is offered at his/her own auction it sells for substantially less money. Undoubtedly you ask yourself, why?

There are a number of reasons this can happen. Ultimately, the answer is simple - It is important to know the types of items your guests really want and their ability to buy them.

Understanding the mindset of your guests is one key. If your event is host to very pragmatic, conservative guests then you probably need to sell practical, functional items. You may have bidders that think, "I'm going to spend the money anyway, let's spend it to support XYZ." If that's the case, remodel packages and landscaping packages may be your best items. Think tangible items that can be traded for value. If your guests are flamboyant, excitable people you will need items to stimulate their senses. A progressive dinner hosted by the chair of your event may be a great option. If your guests are charismatic and spend freely, an amazing dinner with a local celebrity or an all access pass to a concert may be more interesting to them than a new snow blower.

It is also important to recognize the ability of your guests to spend. Some events do not match their items to their bidders. It is not uncommon to have a \$2,000 item in an auction with the most well intentioned bidders, but they just cannot spend that much. Maybe their wallets only allow for \$1,000. Knowing the ability of your bidders to spend will help you plan your live auction items. Understanding this element allows you to recognize it may be best to have two \$800 items instead of one \$1,600 item. It can make for a more enjoyable night for everyone.

Finally, marketing comes into play. If you have a rare or unique item it would make sense to get information out to potential bidders prior to the night of your event. It is so simple and free to do with Facebook and email. With that being said, if you have items that are really rare or only appeal to a limited number of people it may be advantageous to run an ad in a newspaper and accept absentee bids.

They provide medical treatment and rehabilitation to injured birds of prey with the ultimate goal of returning them to the wild. Injured wild birds of prey often collide directly with our modern world by way of auto collision, illegal gunshot, and poisoning. Each year they recover around 150 injured birds of prey. Of those, about 50% are successfully rehabilitated and returned to the wild. The organization also collaborates with others on raptor research projects.



At the core of their work is a well-trained group of educational birds of prey, held on special U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service permits, who serve as ambassadors to their free-flying counterparts. These non-releasable eagles, hawks, owls, and falcons remain a vital component of the educational program, and inspire audiences to new

Sport The Healing Horse

Studies have shown that spending time with a friendly animal, even for 10 to 15 minutes, can increase endorphins released into the body, and decrease the levels of the stress hormone, cortisol. Children who interact with animals learn the value of responsibility, and for a child with disabilities, this responsibility is invaluable.

The K2 Equestrian Center provides equine-assisted therapy in several formats, from working with horses on the ground (non-riding) to therapeutic riding. Programs are customized for individual needs and each session is unique. They serve those with disabilities and partner with regional social service organizations. Team members are certified with the Equine Assisted Growth and Learning Association (EAGALA), the Professional Association of Therapeutic Horsemanship International (PATH), and the Institute of Trauma and Loss in Children (TLC).

The heart of their program is providing a safe place for children, horses and families to experience hope, healing and encouragement. Children are paired with an activity or horse that encourages them toward hope and personal growth. Activities include working with/riding horses, crafts, games, chores, woodworking and life skills. A secondary goal is to educate kids in equine safety and husbandry.

Teamwork, dedication, focus, responsibility, and integrity, are just a few of the numerous teachings learned in sports. 

woman's estimated lifetime **A**risk of developing Alzheimer's disease at age 65 is 1 in 6, compared with nearly 1 in 11 for a man, according to the Alzheimer's Association 2014 Alzheimer's Disease Facts and Figures report. As real a concern as breast cancer is to women's health, women in their 60s are about twice as likely to develop Alzheimer's over the rest of their lives as they are to develop breast cancer.

Adding to women's Alzheimer's burden, there are 2.5 times as many women than men providing intensive "on-duty" care 24 hours a day for someone living with Alzheimer's disease. Among caregivers who feel isolated, women are much more likely than men to link isolation with feeling depressed (17 percent of women vs. 2 percent of men).

In Idaho, there are 22,000 people with Alzheimer's disease, and that number is expected to rise to 33,000 by 2025. The Alzheimer's Association Inland Northwest Chapter, which serves 15 counties in Eastern Washington and 11 counties in North Idaho, provides educational services and support groups for caregivers throughout the chapter territory.

The Walk to End Alzheimer's, which takes place in the fall, aims to raise awareness of the disease and raise money to provide services and support research initiatives. The Palouse Walk is September 27 starting from Toyota of Pullman, and the North Idaho Walk is September 28 at McEuen Park in Coeur d'Alene.



In the last five years, Idaho has lost 83 school-age children to suicide. It is the second leading cause of death for Idaho youth. One in 13 Idaho high school students has made a suicide attempt.

What can we do? The Suicide Prevention Action Network of Idaho (SPAN Idaho) and its Northern Chapter (SPAN North) have been working to change those numbers, most recently in partnership with the Idaho State Department of Education (SDE) through a federal grant from the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA). SPAN Idaho and SDE have created the Idaho Lives Project (ILP) to bring a comprehensive and upstream approach to youth suicide prevention in our state.

Training adults to recognize warning signs for suicide, know how to talk about it and how to get help – or gatekeeper training – is always helpful. However, research shows us that gatekeeper training alone is insufficient. Evidence also shows us that young people are in the best position to identify suicidal peers. Programs in other states have combined student and adult training with mixed results. These results are mixed because even when suicidal youth are identified and referred to help, that help must be effective. Mental health providers need training in evidence-based, best practices for suicide assessment and management.

A new approach. Research in these areas provides the foundation for ILP's comprehensive, three-stage approach to suicide prevention for school-age youth. In stage one, ILP brought clinical suicide expert, David Rudd, PhD, to six locations

throughout Idaho to train almost 500 mental health and primary care professionals in suicide assessment and management. Stage two involved providing gatekeeper training to school staff, parents and community members for participating school communities.

In stage three, ILP selects, thorough an application process, five to seven Idaho middle and high schools to participate each semester over the three years of the federal grant.

ILP uses the Sources of Strength program which is an ongoing, strength-based, comprehensive wellness program that focuses on suicide prevention, but also impacts other issues such as substance abuse and violence. This program trains teams of peer leaders mentored by adult advisors to change peer social norms about seeking help and encourages students to individually assess and develop strengths in their lives. Sources of Strength is the most rigorously researched program of its kind and is proven to improve these aspects within schools and change overall school climate. www.sourcesofstrength.org In October 2013 schools throughout Idaho were asked to submit applications to become part of the first schools to engage in this program. In North

Idaho, Lapwai High School and Priest River High School were selected. The community, staff and peer trainings were conducted by SPAN North and ILP in February and March 2014.

"Sources of Strength had a huge impact on our students at the onset. Our peer leaders are empowered to create the healthy school climate they desire and are working hard to make sure all students experience a sense of belongingness at school. The Adult Advisors are having a blast helping peer leaders with their positive messaging activities. Additionally, I was impressed with the training we received from the national team. It was top notch!" - Libbi Keyes, Principal, Priest River Lamanna High School.

What's happening now? The next round of trainings for Idaho schools and their communities will be this coming October. This includes Sources of Strength training and gatekeeper training for schools, parents and community members.

In addition to ILP's programs for school communities and mental health providers, ILP has a program for youth ages 18 to 24, and a program focusing on youth in the juvenile justice system.



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
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
