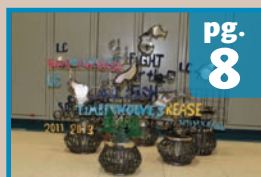

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LAKE CITY HIGH SCHOOL'S OWN TIN MAN CERTAINLY HAS A HEART

Keith Pashby has worked for the Coeur d'Alene School District for nearly 14 years. He is a custodian at Lake City High School, a position he prefers over elementary or junior high positions. "The little kids are wonderful to be around, but oh the crafts!" said Pashby, "There's glitter on everything at every holiday. It's a custodian's challenge for sure." He enjoys the high schoolers because "you can talk to them, get to know them," he said. He's developed a special relationship with many at LCHS for that reason. His way of connecting with them is unique, it's through his lifelong hobby, welding tin sculptures.

Pashby began welding in a college class in 1969. After graduating in Parks Administration, he became a park ranger in 1974, but continued his welding hobby. After taking dozens of classes in Oxy Acetylene Welding, Keith was approached to become an instructor himself, as his art welding techniques had become better than the teachers'.

Since he started welding, he's made hundreds of tin sculptures, including a tree made up of nearly 500 tin can lids that stood over 5 feet tall, and a ball and chain created by surrounding a concrete ball with plate steel to a welded tin chain. Over the years, he's used nuts, bolts, coat hangers along with welding rod and about any other metal, except aluminum. That doesn't work. His preference now is the large gallon size tin cans. "They're readily available from our lunch service, so if I don't like a creation I just start over, and it's a great way to recycle," he said.

His favorite is making the tin can sculptures for his students. Having children of his own who were involved in drama, he felt he could encourage younger students to stay involved by presenting sculptures to seniors. He began making tin flower bouquets for the senior girls with the "Break A Leg" message weaved into the design for opening night

of their plays. This was the first year he made one for a leading man in the theatre. Because the production was Grease the Musical, he created the sculpture with "GREASE is the WORD" instead of "Break a Leg" to give to senior Oskar Owens who played the role of Danny. "It was a first for me. I've done a lot of lady bugs, flowers, and stuff girls like, but this was new." It's not just theatre. Pashby has random students, clubs, and teams in all areas of endeavor at LCHS that he has presented with a gift of his art. Volleyball player C.C. Cates has been on the Timberwolf team for years and was surprised to get a personal metal art sculpture from Pashby. "All the kids think he is one of the nicest guys you'll ever know. I was really excited he gave me a sculpture. It's so encouraging and the coolest thing," said Cates. His Fight for the Fish creation garners itself a special place in the trophy cabinet after 5 consecutive wins of this spirit competition trophy for LCHS.

"Keith is like one of the threads that hold together the fabric of the Lake High School family," said Principle Deanne Clifford. "He supports all of our students and the Timberwolf activities. We're so fortunate to have people like him here."

When asked if his work is for sale he replied, "when the kids see the creations and give me that big smile, that's payment enough." However, he was quick to add that he does sell them once per year, as a fundraiser for the LCHS senior class party at the LCHS Annual Craft Fair. Pashby doesn't think he'll give up his passion for art welding anytime soon. "My wife says it keeps me out of mischief and it's just really relaxing for me. I'll keep at it until I can't any longer." This year's Annual Spring Craft & Garden Show is scheduled for March 19th from 9 - 4pm at LCHS.



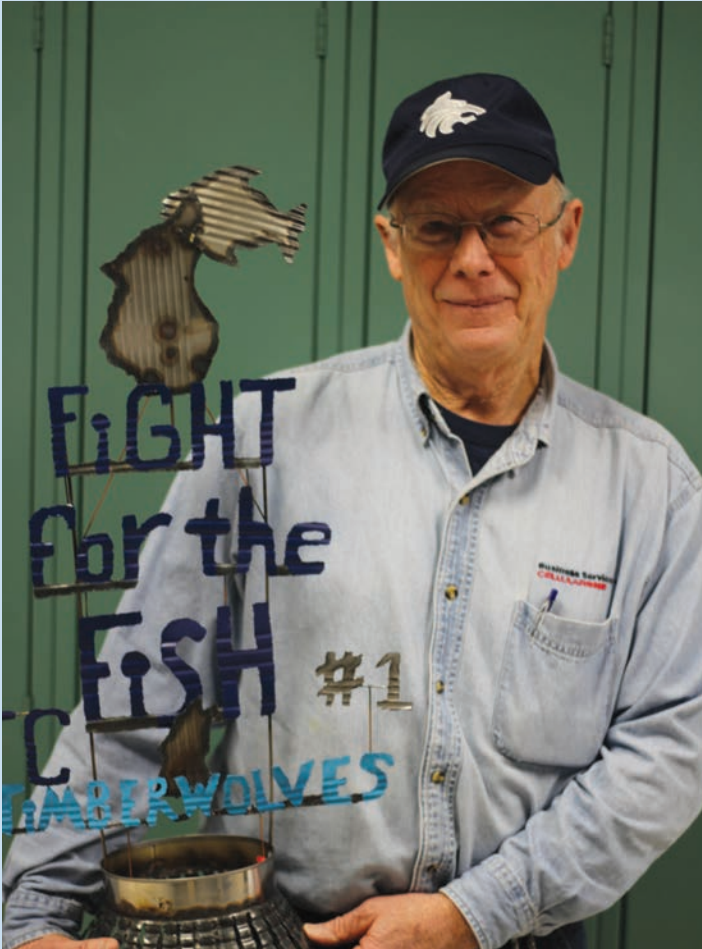
REDUCE | REUSE | RECYCLE But What About Glass?

In October of 2010, Waste Management of Idaho introduced single stream recycling in the Coeur d'Alene area. Recyclables could now be placed all in one bin rather than presorting by type in separate containers. Residential participation went from 28% to 75% within the year. It works, because it's easy and most customers care about their community.

"But what about glass?" is a frequently asked question. According to national statistics as well as local recyclers, glass is a low-value material that is difficult to process and is a commodity that has an ongoing declining market share. In other words, it costs substantially more to recycle glass into glass than to produce new glass. However, there are other uses. Crushed glass for road beds or use in place of concrete and rock at landfills is a "beneficial re-use" form, but it comes with a price and there is a low demand for the product. Glass is currently one of the few commodities that recyclers have to pay a third party to re-use rather than selling like aluminum or paper. Industry groups continue to work to improve the recyclability of glass, however it is a persistent challenge across the country.



The Kootenai Environmental Alliance, is circulating a petition to ask the city to include glass as part of the curbside recycling program. It is estimated to raise rates by \$1- \$2 per month according to their report. Details on all recyclable materials allowed in the area can be found at www.kcgov.us/departments/solidwaste/recycling. Important deadline for 2016 High School Seniors

NOW is the time to apply for financial aid & scholarships for the 2016/2017 school year.



Federal, State, and individual college deadlines vary widely. Most counselors recommend applying for federal financial aid with the FAFSA even if you think you won't qualify, or you think you won't need the aid.

- 2016/2017 FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid) is available NOW (FAFSA.ed.gov – Make sure to use THIS site to apply).
- Early 2016: Deadline for CSS / Financial Aid PROFILE Application (found at CollegeBoard.org)
- March 1, 2016: Idaho Deadline for applying for an Opportunity Grant. (A Federal Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grant (FSEOG) is a grant for undergraduate students with exceptional financial need.)
- Check with your school guidance counselor or visit www.fastweb.com for up-to-date scholarship information.
- Contact your student's potential colleges to find out about school-specific scholarship opportunities and financial aid deadlines.

Don't wait! Even if 2015 taxes have not been filed, the FAFSA application can still be started and then updated later. It is better to start the process than to wait and risk missing deadlines.

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The Power of Mentoring: Making a Difference

Quality mentoring relationships have significant positive effects on youth in a variety of academic, personal, and professional situations.

A 2014 report released by the National Mentoring Partnership, MENTOR, found that young people who were at-risk for not completing high school, but who had a mentor, reported higher educational aspirations and matriculation into post-secondary education, as well as greater engagement in positive activities. They were:

- 55% more likely to be enrolled in college than those who did not have a mentor.
- 81% more likely to report participating regularly in sports or extracurricular activities.
- More than twice as likely to say they held a leadership position in a club or sports team.

- 78% more likely to volunteer regularly in their communities.
- Nearly nine in ten respondents who had a mentor said they are now interested in becoming a mentor.

Press On

Press On is a youth development strategy at The Kroc Center committed to providing middle school students with the experiences needed to become positive contributors in our community. Press On aims to help prevent the high risk behaviors so many students and families are faced with.



The three components of Press On are:

Mentorship: It is through the mentor relationship that a supportive foundation is built. With this foundation, students feel empowered to try new things, become a part of the community and fully benefit from the activities.

Leadership: Students are offered opportunities to grow personally, through Kroc programming in the arts, fitness, culture, and aquatics.

Community: Press On students meet regularly for team-building and interactive projects both at the Kroc and in the community.

The Kroc Center is currently in need of men and women who would like to make a difference in the life of a middle school student. The commitment is 4 hours per month.

Goodwill GoodGuides

The goal of the GoodGuides program is to help youth build career plans and skills, and prepare for school completion, post-secondary training, and productive work.

Goodwill GoodGuides serve 12-17 year old boys and girls who are considered youth at risk by their schools and/or families.

Adult mentors from the community are recruited, trained and supported to be matched to each mentee. The commitment from the mentor and mentee is for four hours per month for twelve months. The program focuses on career awareness with an evidence-based curriculum to support each match.

The program reaches out to teens who don't always feel accepted or included into other areas of their school. The program provides an afterschool opportunity and facilitates group mentoring so all enrollees know they belong to GoodGuides, leading to great friendships, higher self-esteem, and positive improvements in their academics. Each GoodGuides group also seeks out service learning opportunities.

GoodGuides serves 96 teens throughout the Inland Northwest. (The program is unable to enroll new mentees until January of 2017.)

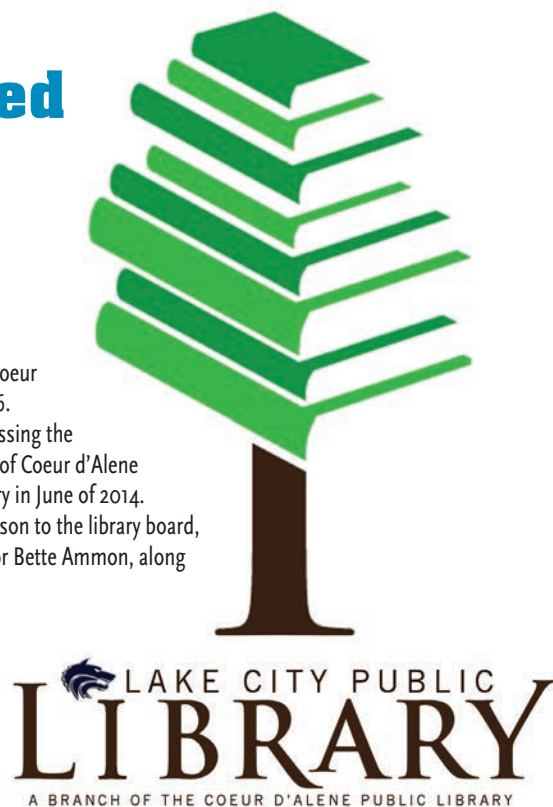
New public library located inside Lake City High School

The Lake City Public Library, a branch of the Coeur d'Alene Public Library, opened in January 2016.

The long range planning team that was addressing the issue of how to serve the growing population of Coeur d'Alene first considered the creation of a branch library in June of 2014. Encouraged by Coeur d'Alene City Council liaison to the library board, Councilmember Kiki Miller, the library Director Bette Ammon, along with Miller, explored the possibility of a branch library in a public school. Ammon was involved with a similar program in Montana before coming to Coeur d'Alene. "It was well worth attempting to present a great solution to serving the growing population, especially in a geographic area made up largely of families with children, that has multi-modality lighted trails already in place," said Miller. "It also meant getting maximum benefit for the tax payer dollar."

Charting a course to determine its feasibility led to the formation of an exploratory committee in September 2014 comprised of the Library Board, City Council, School Board staff and administration, Library Foundation, Chamber of Commerce, Kroc Center, and other community leaders. By September of 2015 the Cd'A City Council had approved the staffing and supplying materials for the branch library and by December the school board approved the plan to house and maintain the branch library in the Lake City High School library.

Opening in January with its own name, the Lake City Public Library, the initial plans are to have the library open to the public Monday through Thursday from 3:00 - 6:30 pm. J.D. Smithson, the branch manager of the LCPL, and also a reference clerk at the Coeur d'Alene Public Library, transfers materials back and forth as well as manages programs, check in, library card functions, etc. During the upcoming summer months Smithson expects to be open in the afternoons with a potential for story times as well as other programs to promote summer reading. Ammon reported that the final plans for the branch are yet to be determined. "This is a very exciting trial basis program. We're looking forward to the community input and figuring out how to address their needs," said Ammon. The Grand Opening is scheduled for February 1st.

KACF: The End of the Mission



The Kootenai Alliance for Children and Families had multiple projects, participants, and collaborations over the past 20 years. In recent years, its major grant refocused its work on teen substance abuse prevention. At the fulfillment of that grant the KACF is transitioning its work and ending its successful era of positive community impact. An excerpt from its closing statement is below:

"Since 1995, the Kootenai Alliance for Children and Families has been working in our community to bring together nonprofits and other organizations to focus on building strong children and strong families. The Alliance's role has been to promote collaboration, bring organizations and programs together, and eliminate the duplication of services.

The newly formed Region I Behavioral Health Board, under the Department of Health and Welfare, has been designed to facilitate this type of work within the region. With that in mind, the steering committee of the Kootenai Alliance for Children and Families is transitioning its work to this very capable group.

KACF is making a \$10,000 gift from our unrestricted funds to the Region I Behavioral Health Board's Children's Mental Health Sub-Committee. The gift will be used for their work in Trauma Informed Care."

The North Idaho Family Magazine was a program the KACF partnered with for over a decade. The North Idaho Family Group supports the membership outreach, communications and marketing programs for area nonprofits in fulfilling its mission of healthy families and lifelong learning. They thank the many hard working, dedicated community and non profit leaders for their outstanding contributions to the area via the KACF.



Program Changes at Anchor House

The Idaho Youth Ranch (IYR) Anchor House campus provides the local community with comprehensive, inclusive and effective therapy for at-risk youth and their families. Their mission is to put them back on the path to a Promising Future.

The Idaho Youth Ranch announced a major change in programming at Anchor House in June 2015. A recent needs assessment involving community stakeholders revealed the need for easily accessible and earlier intervention services. It was clear that a major gap in community resources was support and early intervention to families - specifically in the areas of therapy, parent education & crisis intervention - as well as affordability for services. In response, Anchor House converted their residential facility to an outpatient youth and family therapy center helping families exclusively in northern Idaho.

Now, more youth and families can be served when and where they need it most—before they lose hope and before the youth get involved in the “system.” An evidence-based Equine Therapy (EAGALA) component at The Mica Ranch, Dialectical Behavior Therapy (DBT), and Functional Family Therapy (FFT) are core components of the services. Adding to that are parent classes and on-going support to ensure no therapy occurs in a vacuum. Please note that the organization also consolidated and moved IYR’s Adoption Services program, so they too are now located at the Anchor House facility.

Anchor House has been accepting new youth and families and there are current openings for services. The Idaho Youth Ranch is not letting money be a barrier to therapy. They don’t take insurance, but rely mostly on their thrift store sales and donor contributions for financial support. They are committed to working with people so no child or family will ever be denied help due to an inability to pay.

Idaho Needs Foster Parents

There is a great need for foster parents in Idaho, especially in smaller communities and in outlying areas where finding foster parents is a challenge. Foster care provides a temporary home until a child can be safely reunited with his or her family. With more than 1,200 Idaho children in foster care due to abuse, neglect or family crisis, there is a constant need for foster and/or adoptive parents across the state. A variety of families are needed to meet the various needs of children in foster care, including families who are willing to take sibling groups, older youth, and children with special needs.

Foster parents come in all shapes and sizes and from all socioeconomic, religious, ethnic and racial backgrounds. Foster parents must be 21 years old, have sufficient income to support the household, have a clear background check and be in good physical and mental health. There is no maximum age for foster care or adoption. Any additional individuals 18 and older residing in the home must also clear a background check. A complete home study and foster care training is also required.

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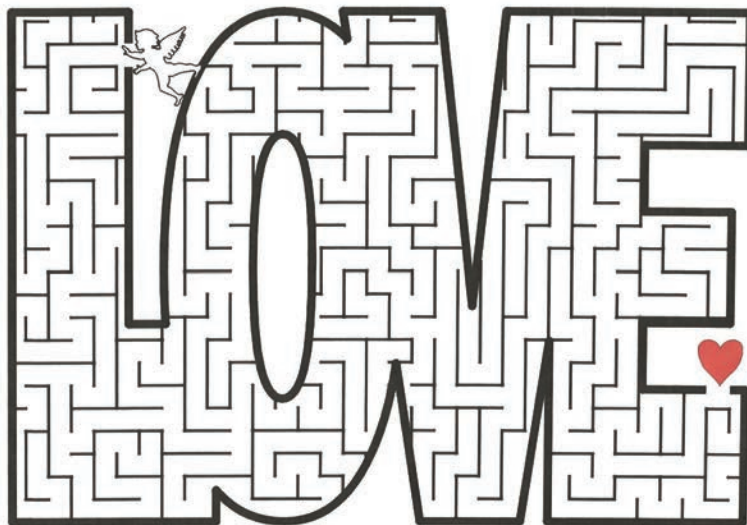

Northern Idaho Crisis Center Now Open

The Northern Idaho Crisis Center opened in December 2015 to serve individuals in mental health crisis situations in North Idaho. The Center operates 24 hours a day, seven days a week, and 365 days a year and provides an environment to de-escalate mental health patients or substance abusers who are in crisis.

The center's purpose will be to assess patients and help them efficiently access additional community resources that meet their needs. The center will serve patients for less than 24 hours, and will then refer clients to inpatient, outpatient hospital care, or counseling before a patient leaves the center.

Personnel from local law enforcement agencies have been advocating for a mental health facility in North Idaho for several years because it will take the pressure off emergency rooms, courts, and jails.

The crisis center is free, safe, and private, and no referral is needed.

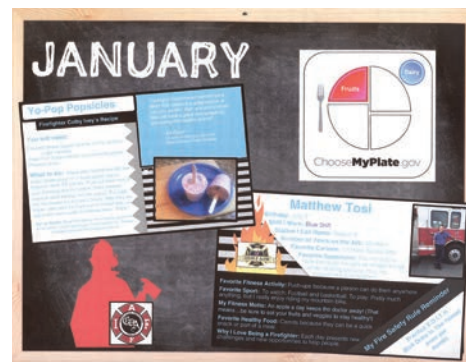

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Idaho Disaster Dogs

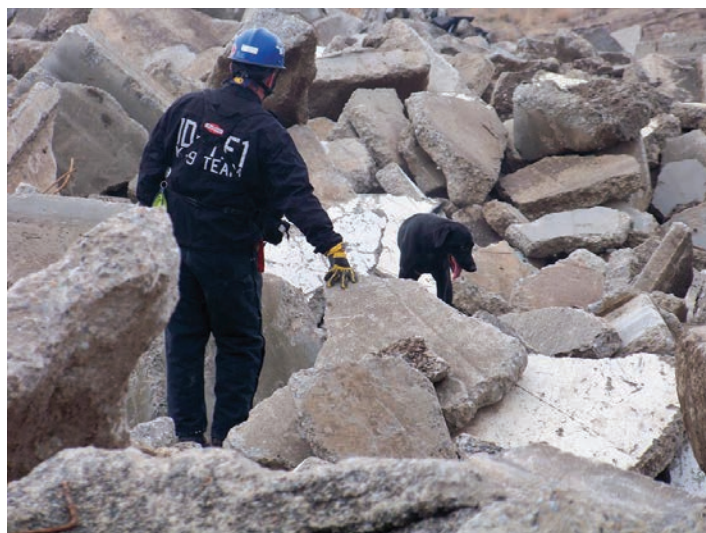
Idaho Disaster Dogs is a nonprofit group of Search dogs and handlers hosted by the Coeur d'Alene Fire Department. The team was formed in 2005 to provide canine search capabilities as a resource for the Idaho Urban Search And Rescue Taskforce 1. The state of Idaho has three USAR taskforce teams: 1- CDA, 2-Boise, and 3-Idaho Falls/Pocatello. The Disaster Dogs are the only USAR Search dog component of the Idaho teams.

Handlers and support personnel are a mix of firefighters from the City of Coeur d'Alene Fire Department, Northern Lakes Fire Protection District, and local civilian members who volunteer their time. Funding for search and rescue operations is based largely on the situation with the predominant amount being solely volunteer. The Idaho Disaster Dogs is a 501(c)3 organization which is supported by the generosity and donations from the North Idaho and eastern Washington communities.

The mission of the organization is:

- To provide trained dogs, handlers, and support personnel for the search and rescue of live persons trapped due to manmade or natural disasters;
- To provide trained dogs, handlers and support personnel for the search and recovery of deceased persons lost, trapped or drowned;
- To provide services to government agencies on a 24-hour basis at no cost, as a benefit to the public
- To provide training and education for its dogs and personnel to develop and improve those capabilities that will ensure competent and capable rescue and recovery operations

The North Idaho team currently has eight dogs. Three are certified as live find dogs and one is a trained, proficient recovery / cadaver dog. The other four dogs are puppies (between 6 and 24 months old) and are training to become certified. Some of the dogs participate on the WA-TF, a recognized FEMA Team, in Western Washington, which can be deployed around the world for disasters responded to by FEMA.

It is a vital resource for first responders, who must quickly triage and assist individuals in crisis. Police & fire department personnel and other immediate needs providers can find the information they need in one location.

The database currently has about 600 agencies listed, primarily in Kootenai County and Region 1. However, hundreds more will be added, due to the opening of the Northern Idaho Crisis Center, which opened in December 2015 and serves the 10 northern counties. Website improvements for customized reporting, member login for agencies & funders, outreach & marketing, and database updates & maintenance are also planned.
