Make a Difference!



Civic Engagement Alliance organized a CDA VOTES 2020 campaign to increase voter turnout locally and encourage informed voting. Over 100 volunteers sent out over 2,100 educational vote reminder postcards. We combined art with personalized nonpartisan voter engagement messaging & education to community members. Many of our volunteers were children!

They created a nonpartisan local voting resources portal on our website at https://www.civicengagecda.com/voterguide to help people research down-ballot races and ballot measures. This is a one-stop-shop that integrates quality resources such as VOTE 411, Ballotpedia, Vote Smart, and the CDA Press Meet the Candidates. We designed and distributed a locally focused, visual voting resource door hangers meant for the first-time or occasional voter.

Leaf Fest 2020

As the fall turns to winter every year City of CDA street crews begin their annual Leaf-fest. Leaf Pickup historically will generate over 1400 tons of leaves from all corners of town.

The leaves are pulled away from the gutter of the streets where loaders will bunch them into the intersections. The leaves are shredded, to become compost.

Tuesday, November 12th, 2020 marks the start of the Coeur d'Alene's annual leaf pick-up program. **Please keep leaves on your property until Sunday, November 1st**. After this time, leaves may be placed in the street **at least one foot from the curb** to allow for water drainage. City crews and equipment are limited, so they need your help. Leaves will be picked up only once. Please do not put leaves in the street after city crews have completed your area and do not include bagged leaves, branches, debris or trash.

Pick-up will start south of Sherman Avenue and move north. The City expects completion before December 4th, 2020. Follow their progress on maps.cdaid.org/leaf.

When Leaf Pickup begins in your neighborhood:

- Please keep your eyes and ears out for equipment.
- Please move vehicles off the street.
- Sweepers come behind the crews to clean the streets, and their goal is curb-to-curb cleaning.
- Please do not put any leaves out after they have completed your neighborhood.

Get Ready for Winter! Popular Programs at

Cold weather is just around the corner! Don't forget to get your house prepared for the cooler months ahead! Here are some home maintenance ideas to help keep your home operating in peak condition all winter long:



- Check foundation for cracks and caulk around the areas where necessary to prevent heat from escaping.
- Make sure the roof is in good shape. Inspect for missing and loose shingles.
- Clean out gutters and downspouts and tighten brackets if necessary to help avoid an ice dam.
- Weather-strip your garage door.
- Have your heating system serviced by a licensed HVAC company to help ensure more fuel efficiency, fewer problems and longer life of the system.
- Change the direction of your ceiling fan to create an upward draft for redistribution of warm air.
- Drain garden hoses and shut off outdoor water valves.
- Check to see that all of your snow equipment is up and running before the first snow falls!

Your Library Network



Your Community Library Network serves Kootenai County, west Shoshone County, and beyond with virtual programs and over one hundred videos on YouTube and Facebook. Video content helps create a sense of community even in a time of physical distance. From storytime sessions to craft tutorials, and a lighthearted introduction to the Dewey decimal system, librarians create entertaining and educational videos for all.

The Community Library Network offers 24-hour access to digital materials including free music, audiobooks, and research databases. The "Homeschool E-Resource Guide," a new digital resource, lists nearly 150 weblinks for new and experienced families in the homeschool community.

While in-person programs are currently on hold at the library, the Library Network has made some exciting developments in its outreach efforts. The Library just opened a free STEAM and literacy activity space for early learners and their families in the Silver Lake Mall called the Little Discovery Corner. Additionally, the Discovery Bus (a new 60-foot STEAM mobile unit) and the Bookmobile are making regular visits to area schools and community locations.

All eight Community Library Network library locations have resumed normal operating hours. During this time, popular

services include free, and faster-than-ever, Wi-Fi and printer access. Members can also try take-home DIY crafts called Grab and Go kits. In the fall of 2020, librarians will have even more advanced take-home kits, tools, and equipment with a new service called the "Library of Things." Members can check out explorative, creative, fun kits of "things" and return them just like books!

COLLEGE CHOICES AVAILABLE IN COEUR D'ALENE

It's now easier than ever to get a college degree and not even leave North Idaho. Whether you're in high school, about to graduate from high school, or you've been out of school for many years, there's lots of higher education opportunities in our backyard.

Not only are there a wide variety of courses to choose from, there's also variety when it comes to the type of degree to pursue. Here's some basic information about North Idaho colleges and universities:

WHAT COLLEGES AND UNIVERSITIES ARE IN COEUR D'ALENE?:

- North Idaho College
- · University of Idaho
- · Lewis-Clark State College
- · Boise State University
- · Idaho State University

WHERE ARE THE COLLEGES LOCATED?

The DeArmond Building was officially opened in September 2019 to serve all five colleges and universities represented at the North Idaho College Campus. Students are able to speak with college representatives to work on their admission & transfer process, financial aid, tutoring, and more.

WHAT'S AVAILABLE FROM EACH COLLEGE OR UNIVERSITY?

For an excellent overview of what is offered in CdA, visit www.northidahohighereducation.org. There you'll find a summary of each school, a summary of what programs they offer, and links to the colleges' websites.

THE APPLICATION PROCESS

Each school has a slightly different process, but here's some basic information that will help.

- Idaho colleges operate on a semester system. In general that means one semester begins in August and the other in January. Most colleges also offer a compressed summer session.
- 2. The Idaho State Board of Education has made applying to Idaho Colleges even easier. Seniors receive an

acceptance letter from Idaho Colleges based on their test scores. They can then follow these steps from the nextsteps.idaho.gov website:

- Use the Idaho Schools Directory to research your options.
- Compare your options side by side.
- Think about visiting an Idaho college campus.
- Use Apply Idaho to submit applications to the Idaho colleges and universities you may want to attend, with no application fee.

FINANCIAL AID AND SCHOLARSHIPS

Going to college is expensive. Be sure to tap into every resource you have to help fund your college experience. Here are a few tips:


- Visit your college website and search for scholarship opportunities. Every college has scholarship money available. You'll also find lots of information and links on their website to great resources to help pay for college.
- 2. Complete and submit the Free Application for Federal Student Aid or FAFSA. It's the federal government program for financial aid and student loans.

 Each college can help you learn about the financial aid process and there's lots of information online at studentaid.ed.gov/sa/fafsa
- There is funding available for Idaho high school students that helps pay for college tuition for dual credit classes or exams. Check with your high school counseling office for how to apply.
- 4. Visit edinfocentercda.com/Pay-for-School/North-Idaho-Scholarships for the most comprehensive list of local, state, and regional scholarships

A FEW MORE THINGS!

- Don't be afraid to ask LOTS of questions.
- The Admissions Office at every college is there to help you.
- You're not the only one to ask that question! Keep asking questions until you understand exactly what needs to be done.
- Deadlines are deadlines. There's no flexibility. Start early so you have lots of time to figure it out.

Educational Trauma and Learning Differences

When a local parent sat down with his son to teach him math at the start of 3rd grade, the first thing his son said was, "Math is my nemesis." His emotional response to learning hit this father like a truck. He wasn't just dealing with a learning disability in dyslexia, he was dealing with the beginnings of educational trauma.

A person with dyslexia has average or above average intelligence, but has difficulty in the areas of language processing. The traditional educational system is usually unable to remediate language processing difficulties, most often due to the uniquely intensive skill in that area that is required.

More examples from discussions with other parents include:

- A student breaks down crying when the teacher announces they will be journaling.
- Students are constantly told they are or made to feel stupid or lazy.
- Students are regularly taken out of class and made to feel weird.
- A student was made to do his homework on the floor of the boys bathroom.
- A student loves COVID school from home because the other students don't know that she only gets 1 of 10 spelling words right.
- Every Friday a student is humiliated with her times tables, when each student is required to announce their score in front of everyone, and the teacher makes a sarcastic comment on her low scores.
- Students are regularly held in class during recess, and held back in grades and compelled to repeat the same education that didn't work the first time.

Trauma is an emotional response to stress to a disturbing event or situation in one's life that causes a person to struggle to cope. It can cause strong feelings of hopelessness and diminish a person's self-worth, self-loathing and learned helplessness.

Trauma negatively changes the brain. Educational trauma causes the brain to have persistent changes that make learning even more difficult.

If nothing is done about educational trauma, students with dyslexia have these outcomes:

- 35% of students with dyslexia drop out
- 50% of people in drug & alcohol treatment have dyslexia
- 70% of juvenile delinquents (youth in jail) have dyslexia
- 50% of people in prison have dyslexia

If something is changed, empowered people with dyslexia represent:

Learning about Learning

- 35% of Entrepreneurs
- 40% of self-made millionaires
- 50% of rocket scientists
- Overrepresented in the arts and entertainment

Parents currently have to pay for Dyslexia services out of pocket. Taxpayer funded schools are challenged to help kids with dyslexia, because it's deemed a medical diagnosis. The medical professionals will say it requires an educational intervention. Dyslexia services are not covered by medical insurance. Most schools aren't equipped to provide the intensive services needed. Parents are left with a terrible choice: fight a very expensive, exhausting and long battle to enforce IDEA, or find a private solution. Meanwhile the mental health and self esteem of the child suffers. The cost both financial and mental is staggering.

DIRECTIONS


- 1. 15×10" Preheat the oven to 350°F. Butter a 15×10" jelly roll pan and set aside.

- Slice into squares and enjoy!







Mammograms save lives!

North Idaho woman says screening caught breast cancer early

Nearly 10 years ago, Sheri Meidinger went to the doctor for an appointment to check on a painful knee.

The medical staff asked her if she wanted to get a mammogram as part of their routine with patients. Sheri remembered it had been a while since her last screening and thought it would be a good idea especially since she was already at the doctor's office. Why come back for another appointment?

That fateful decision probably saved her life.

"I had no symptoms and I thought, 'I am 42, it's not going to happen to me,'" said Meidinger, a Medical Assistant with Heritage Health. "But it can happen. Breast cancer is not discriminatory. It can happen to anybody."

Her initial mammogram caused her doctor to order a second. Then a needle biopsy. Sheri had intraductal carcinoma, uncontrolled growth of cells within the breast ducts. Tests revealed the cancer had not spread throughout her body.

"I was in stage 1 and it was about to go to stage 2," said Meidinger. "Everything happened so quick. Within two weeks, I was having surgery (a lumpectomy) and then I started radiation. Fortunately, I didn't have to have chemotherapy."

She looks back at that whirlwind experience and realizes how close she came to becoming another fatal breast cancer statistic.

"It wouldn't have been caught by a normal breast exam," she said. "It was all found by the mammogram. It's not in my family history. If I had waited another year, who knows what stage the cancer would have advanced to. A mammogram absolutely saved my life."

Others aren't so lucky.

Breast cancer is the most common cancer among women in the United States. One in eight women will be diagnosed with breast cancer during their lifetimes.

More than 40,000 women and men die from breast cancer every year. Many of these deaths could have been avoided, said Taryn Grattic, Post Falls Clinic Medical Director.

"Breast cancer is highly preventable by doing mammogram screenings," said Grattic. "I have personally witnessed being able to catch something that would have resulted in the patient dying."

Grattic says women should have mammograms every two years after they turn 50 years old.

Some women are considered high-risk if a primary relative has had breast cancer. Those women should have annual mammograms starting at age 40. She also notes that

women should perform self-exams regularly.

"Mammograms are incredibly important," said Grattic. "The screenings really do save lives."

This year, Heritage Health is partnering with Kootenai Outpatient Imaging to deliver mammograms to its patients. No referral is necessary.

Sheri has been cancer-free for almost 10 years. She shares her story in hopes of inspiring other women to get their mammograms.

"It doesn't hurt," said Sheri. "Yes, it's a little uncomfortable, but it's a very simple and life-saving thing to do. You have family, children, friends, who are all there in your life. They don't want to lose you. I tell all my patients to get their mammograms because it's so important."



Holiday Crafts & Recipes

Coffee Filter Thanksgiving Turkeys

MATERIALS

- Wooden Spring Clothespins
- Round White Coffee Filters
- Assorted Googly Eyes
- Washable Markers Brown, Red, Orange, and Yellow
- Glue gun and glue sticks or a Liquid Glue with fine tip applicator
- Brown Acrylic Craft Paint
- Red and Yellow Craft Foam
- Paintbrush
- Scissors
- Pencil

MATERIALS

- Scrap of cardboard
- Non-Stick Craft Mat or Large Plastic Zip Top Bag
- Water Spray Bottle

INSTRUCTIONS

- Start by flattening out round coffee filters. Draw on them with red, yellow, and orange washable markers in a variety of patterns.
- Place colored coffee filter on a craft mat or zipper bag and spray with water. Have fun watching the magic of the colors move and blend! Set aside to dry.
- Use a scrap of cardboard to clip the clothespins onto for easier painting. Paint all sides of the clothespin with brown craft paint and a paintbrush. Set aside to dry.
- Glue on the wiggly googly eyes. You can use a low temp hot glue gun or a tacky craft glue.
- Now it's time to decorate the turkey's face! Cut out a triangle beak from yellow craft foam and a squiggly waddle from the red craft foam with scissors.
- Glue the beak and wattle (aka gobbler) below the eyes.
- Fold the dry coffee filters in half and crinkle slightly to fluff them.
- Insert coffee filter into top clip of clothespin to be the turkey's feathers.
- You can insert the dyed coffee filter as is or cut a scalloped edge to give the feathers more definition.

NOTES

• Easily make just one or several turkeys at a time. Drying times may vary and impact total time from start to finish of this project.

Candy Cane Chocolate Bark

INGREDIENTS

- 1 cup white chocolate candy melts
- 1 cup dark chocolate candy melts
- 3 Tbsp. crushed candy canes
- wax paper

DIRECTIONS

- · Line a cookie sheet with wax paper. Set aside.
- Place dark chocolate melts in a medium microwavable bowl. Microwave on medium power for 30 seconds. Stir mixture and continue to microwave for 30 second intervals until chocolate is completely melted.
- Pour dark chocolate onto prepared cookie sheet and spread over surface with a spatula. Place cookie sheet in the refrigerator to harden.
- In the meantime melt white chocolate melts using the same 30 second interval method. Pour
 the melted white chocolate over the hardened dark chocolate on the cookie sheet.
- Using a knife, draw lines through the chocolate layers to create a pattern. Sprinkle with crushed candy canes.
- Return cookie sheet to the refrigerator until the bark has hardened.
- Once completely cooled and hardened remove from the fridge and break apart into pieces.
- Store in a sealed container in a cool dark place so it does not melt.
